Re: Fiscal Year 2022-23 Dignity Fund-eligible budget & expenditures

This annual report to the Oversight and Advisory Committee examines all Dignity Fundeligible services funded from July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023 (FY 2022-23). It also presents a proposed plan for the available year-end balance.

FY 2022-23 budget

Sources

In FY 2022-23, the total budget for all Dignity Fund-eligible (DF-eligible) services was **\$127.2** million. The DF-eligible budget was comprised of five principal sources:

- The **\$56.1 million** Dignity Fund baseline;
- \$15.1 million in accumulated Dignity Fund savings;
- \$34.6 million in supplemental General Fund for DF-eligible services. This amount includes mayoral initiatives and addbacks issued by the Board of Supervisors, as well as funds appropriated to the Community Living Fund;
- \$17.8 million in state and federal grants, including Older Americans Act dollars, among others; and
- A one-time **\$3.6 million** restoration to the Dignity Fund for DF-eligible expenditures related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Uses

DAS budgeted this Dignity Fund-eligible budget for three uses:

- \$117.8 million for 246 contracts for the delivery of services across the seven Dignity Fund service areas;
- \$4.2 million in interdepartmental services agreements with the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency for transportation connections to existing DAS services; the Department of Public Health for fall prevention safety; the Office of the Treasurer & Tax Collector for one-on-one financial counseling for LGBTQ+ clients, and the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development for the allocation of rental subsidies from the Senior Operating Subsidies (SOS) Program Fund; and
- **\$5.1 million** in salary and benefits supporting intake staff at the DAS Benefits and Resources Hub at 2 Gough.

Expenditure highlights include:

New state and federal grants. In FY 2022-23, DAS received **38**% more grant funding than it did in FY 2021-22. Of note, **\$6.1 million** came in the form of one-time awards. New grants supported caregiver respite, digital divide, legal assistance, and nutrition.

Year-end encumbrances. Much of the of the \$18.8 million in unspent contract balance was encumbered towards the end of the fiscal year. These funds remain committed for use in Fiscal Year 2023-24.

Interdepartmental services. Reserves in the Senior Operating Subsidies Program Fund represented \$3.2 million of the budget for interdepartmental services. DAS continues to hold on to this funding pending housing developments managed by the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development.

FY 2022-23 Dignity Fund-eligible services balance

Table 4 shows that, of the **\$28.9 million** balance shown in Table 3, **\$18.8 million** is encumbered in contracts, \$3.2 million is reserved for Senior Operating Subsidies, and \$0.7 million was saved in the Community Living Fund.

Table 5 presents DAS's proposed plan for the available **\$6.2 million** year-end balance.
