ARRIBA JUNTOS

Marlén Sánchez, Community Services Specialist, presented the request to enter into a new grant agreement with ARRIBA JUNTOS.

President Kahn's call for public comment yielded no responses.

On motion of Commissioner Coghlan McDonald, seconded and unanimously carried, the Commission approved the request to enter into a new grant agreement with ARRIBA JUNTOS for the provision of the Digital Services Program; for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2029; in the amount of \$1,660,000 plus a 10% contingency for a total grant amount not to exceed \$1,826,000.

SAN FRANCISCO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (SFUSD)

Amy Freer, Program Support Analyst, presented the request to enter into a new contract agreement with SAN FRANCISCO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (SFUSD).

Commissioner Coghlan McDonald asked if the Agency's foster youth who are placed outside the city continue to attend SFUSD schools to which Amy replied yes, by law, foster youth must attend their school of origin. Then Commissioner Coghlan McDonald asked how does the transportation to and from school work? Amy replied that transportation challenges certainly exist for foster youth placed outside San Francisco attending their schools of origin. She added that there are many ways FCS tries to mitigate the transportation issues, whether it's the foster parents providing transportation or the use of public transportation, and staff at Foster Youth

Services are always thinking outside the box for solutions. Vice President McCray asked how many youth are being served? Amy replied that SFUSD's Foster Youth Services program served 453 students in "this last year." Executive Director Rhorer added that there are about 450 children (age newborn-18 years old) in out-of-home placement, and there are children in Family Maintenance. The number of school-age kids in out-of-home care is about 250 to 275. He added that this number is a point in time. The number of children fluctuates—many children go in and out of placement. SFUSD's Foster Youth Program serving 453 students is an excellent penetration rate and a big improvement from past years. President Kahn noted that the chaos these children experience must be overwhelming at times and Amy added that there is stability in school. She shared additional challenges, for example that many children move frequently and the Program must stay on top of where their placements are.

President Kahn's call for public comment yielded no responses.

President Kahn's call for public comment related to the APA FAMILY SUPPORT SERVICES grant yielded one response:

Fanny Lam, Executive Director of APA Family Support Services, "I would just like to say a few words about this program. We have been a grantee since 2023 for the culturally appropriate food program and we are, we have been serving the community for 38 years and we have never seen anything like this. We serve 8,000 children, families and parents per year and 90% of our families are monolingual families. We're able to purchase seasonal food [and] culturally appropriate food and healthy food for our families in the past two years and we're really looking forward to doing that in the coming four years. For the program impact, I would like to share a some statistics that we have: in the past fiscal year, we have 100% satisfaction from this food program, 98% on the quality of the food program, 99% [of our] families feel very welcomed and respected, 98% feel the food they received is culturally relevant, and 96% know that they have reduced hunger in this food program, and 100% learned about healthy cooking and healthy eating from this program. I would really love for you to continue to support us as we build healthy families, strengthen cultural identities and protect food security in these programs. And lastly, I would like to thank the Citywide Food Access Team. The entire team that we have met has been really wonderful and they have built a beautiful network of food partners and community-based partnerships and organizations to support the cultural and community-center programs for the city. Thank you."

Shakira Simley, Executive Director of the Booker T. Washington Community Service Center, "Thank you so much to our HSA hardworking team. Booker T. Washington Community Center is in the Fillmore Western Addition and is San Francisco's oldest Black-led, Black-serving nonprofit organization with 106 years of service to the community. I'm here today because I want to commend

HSA for their diligence and support. We're heading into about our 3rd year with this program and everyone knows, earlier this year, the Fillmore Safeway closed suddenly and abruptly, which was the equivalent of a nuclear retail bomb going off in our neighborhood. Thousands of residents in the Fillmore Western Addition lost access to a full-service grocery store, pharmacy, bank, and cafe, and that gaping hole still exists today in our community. If Booker T. Washington did not have the help, support, flexibility, and adaptation to meet this need, thousands of Fillmore residents would have gone hungry, and I'm talking about families, seniors, foster youth, children under the age of five. Additionally, with the threat that's happening on a national level, the gutting of SNAP and WIC programs, we're worried about the impacts this will have on our community moving forward. This grant is a lifeline given that hole in our neighborhood. We were able to expand our neighborhoods with an increase of 500 households in the past three months given the closure of the Safeway due to this grant. A lot of that work is centered on schools like Rosa Parks Elementary and all of the dense affordable and subsidized housing sites that are directly around the Fillmore [Safeway] closure. Booker T. Washington serves over 6,000 people a year. Our food justice program is one of our largest with over 2,000 folks fed on a weekly basis, and I cannot understate this impact... Shakira shared a comment from a client, Linda, 'We are delighted to have a solution to the problem of the Safeway closing and leaving the Western Addition high and dry like a food desert without an affordable, convenient grocery store. Participants like getting a box of produce weekly with such ease, no more long trips by bus to the store. It's especially helpful for those who have limited strength and mobility to instead walk a short distance for their food instead of lugging groceries back home by bus or by walking. The community connection that has resulted from this program has been incredible. Of our 300 apartments, there are many people who have never met each other. Neighbors now like to chat, they like to meet new people, help each other out, share recipes, and because we set up our tables outdoors, older adults get outside in the fresh air and sun and socialize a bit. We have a table for any surplus supplies and items if people would like to share with each other. People who have learned about new vegetables and fruits. We share cooking tips with each other during leek season, we displayed how to cut and clean them. Thank you so much for your tremendous help in providing not only produce, but essential groceries like dairy items and eggs. Our members are truly appreciative.' Thank you."

Vice President McCray asked about this Program as it relates to the citywide safety efforts. Sam Dodge, Program Director with the Department of Emergency Management (DEM) confirmed that yes, this [Program] was approved by the Mayor's Office under the fentanyl emergency ordinance; their desire is to make this program work seamlessly with the Drug Market Agency Coordination Center (DMACC) which is a San Francisco Police Department and Department of Public Health led effort. It is a very successful program and has a long track record of success, especially coming out of COVID, and has been studied by Stanford and others. The Program is correlated with a 30% - 60% reduction in 911 calls in the areas where they are deployed. Taking lived experience and cultural competency together with training and support and resources and it's proven to be a really effective measure for the neighborhoods where we are able to deploy.
